Foxy Facts &

Here are some foxy facts to impress your friends:

- There are 37 species of foxes in the world. The fox in the UK is the red fox (Vulpes vulpes)
- Red foxes are part of the dog family, and are distant relatives of wolves
- Foxes are one of the most well known wild animals in the UK
- It is thought that, in London, there are as many as 18 foxes in every square kilometre
- Foxes are mostly active at night
- A female fox is called a vixen
- A male fox is called a dog
- A baby fox is called a cub or kit
- A group of foxes is called a skulk or leash
- Foxes are omnivorous which means they eat almost anything; their usual diet is birds, worms, insects, fruit and small mammals such as mice and rats. In city areas, the food we throw away can make up more than half a fox's diet.
- A fox's home is called a den or earth. Vixens dig their dens under tree roots or garden sheds, or enlarge other holes such as old rabbit burrows
- Foxes hide or bury spare food to eat later, although another fox may find it first
- Foxes communicate with each other using at least 20 different types of sounds
- A fox can run 30 miles per hour
- A fox's tail is called a brush
- A fox's eyes are similar to a cat's with narrow, vertical pupils. This helps them to see at night



- Foxes have amazing hearing, it is said they can hear a watch ticking nearly 40 metres away!
- Foxes have been spotted riding on the lifts and carriages of the London Underground.

How to spot a fox track:



Fox footprints are very similar to dog footprints: four toes, a central pad and claw marks.

The key difference is that the pads and toes of a fox print are more spread out; meaning a diagonal cross can be drawn through a fox print and not through a dog print.
